Biographical Notes of the Participants

Cecilia Alemany is the Coordinator of the Red Mercosur, and a PhD candidate on Multidisciplinary Studies of Latin American Societies (IHEAL - University Paris III Sorbonne La Nouvelle) since 2004. She has an M.A. on International Forecasting (Paris V, Sorbonne) and another on International Relations (Universidad de la República, Uruguay). She is Senior Advocacy Associate at the Association for Women's Rights in Development (AWID) and professor of Local Development Planning at the Latin American Center on Human Economics (CLAEH).

Stephen Baranyi is an Associate Professor at the School of International Development and Global Studies at the University of Ottawa. Previously, he worked as human rights advocate in the European Union, policy adviser to Canadian government agencies, grant manager at IDRC, and principal researcher at the North-South Institute. He has also published widely on the interface of development and security -- such as peacebuilding, land policies and fragile states – as well as on Canadian policy, and the roles of certain international organisations.

Louis Bélanger is a Professor of Political Science at Laval University (Hautes Études Internationales – HEI), where he obtained his PhD and Master degrees. His areas of specialization include foreign policies of Canada and Quebec, theories of international relations and foreign policies, as well as transformations of the international contemporary system.

Albert Berry is a Professor Emeritus of Economics and Research Director of the Programme on Latin America and the Caribbean at the Centre for International Studies of the University of Toronto. He holds a PhD from Princeton University and is the author of several publications in academic journals including Challenge: The Magazine of Economic Affairs, Review of Income and Wealth, and Latin American Research Review. He focuses on economic development, labour issues and international economics.

Eduardo Bianchi is a Research Leader in FLACSO and the Coordinator of Projects on Trade & Poverty in LATN (Latin American Trade Network). He has an M.A. degree and is a PhD in economics from New York University, as well as a BA in Economics from the University of Buenos Aires. He has been a WTO instructor and panelist, and helf positions with large public responsibilities as head of the Director of International Trade Commission and Undersecretary for International Economic Relations in Argentina. He also teaches contingency trade measures at the Catholic University of Argentina and the University of Tres de Febrero in Buenos Aires.

Roberto Bouzas (UDESA, Argentina/Red Mercosur) is a Professor at the Universidad de San Andrés and an independent researcher at CONICET. He has an M.A. in economics from Cambridge University, England and a B.A. in economics from the University of Buenos Aires. He is also the Academic Director of the Master of International Relations and Negotiations Program run jointly by FLACSO-Universidad de San Andrés-Universidad de Barcelona, and a Professor of international economics in the Faculty of Economics at University of Buenos Aires.

Andrew Cooper is Associate Director and Distinguished Fellow at the Centre for International Governance Innovation and a Professor of political science at the University of Waterloo, where he teaches in international political economy, global governance and comparative politics. He is a member of the International Advisory Board of both the GARNET Network of Excellence and the Hague Journal of Diplomacy, and has been a member of the Warwick Commission. Dr. Cooper's most recent publications focus on emerging powers, G8 reform, small states, Latin America, global health governance and the phenomenon of celebrity diplomacy.

Jean Daudelin is an Assistant Professor in the Norman Paterson School of International Affairs (NPSIA) at Carleton University and holds a PhD from Laval University. He is a specialist on Latin America, particularly Brazil and Central America, where he has researched religious movements, indigenous politics, urban violence, economic integration, and regional politics. His current research focuses on property rights and conflict, on the development and conflict implications of government revenue composition, and on the comparative foreign policy of Canada and Brazil.

Daniel Drache is a Professor of political science at York University and Associate Director of the Robarts Centre for Canadian Studies. He has worked and published extensively on the area of globalization in its economic, social and cultural dimensions. He has worked on the WTO's Doha Round with particular focus on TRIPS and public health, food security and nutrition, and poverty eradication. His current research themes include North American integration, the role of borders in NAFTA, and the impact of new information technologies.
