

Biographical Notes of the Participants

Cecilia Alemany is the Coordinator of the Red Mercosur, and a PhD candidate on Multidisciplinary Studies of Latin American Societies (IHEAL - University Paris III Sorbonne La Nouvelle) since 2004. She has an M.A. on International Forecasting (Paris V, Sorbonne) and another on International Relations (Universidad de la República, Uruguay). She is Senior Advocacy Associate at the Association for Women's Rights in Development (AWID) and professor of Local Development Planning at the Latin American Center on Human Economics (CLAEH).

Stephen Baranyi is an Associate Professor at the School of International Development and Global Studies at the University of Ottawa. Previously, he worked as human rights advocate in the European Union, policy adviser to Canadian government agencies, grant manager at IDRC, and principal researcher at the North-South Institute. He has also published widely on the interface of development and security -- such as peacebuilding, land policies and fragile states -- as well as on Canadian policy, and the roles of certain international organisations.

Louis Bélanger is a Professor of Political Science at Laval University (Hautes Études Internationales – HEI), where he obtained his PhD and Master degrees. His areas of specialization include foreign policies of Canada and Quebec, theories of international relations and foreign policies, as well as transformations of the international contemporary system.

Albert Berry is a Professor Emeritus of Economics and Research Director of the Programme on Latin America and the Caribbean at the Centre for International Studies of the University of Toronto. He holds a PhD from Princeton University and is the author of several publications in academic journals including *Challenge: The Magazine of Economic Affairs*, *Review of Income and Wealth*, and *Latin American Research Review*. He focuses on economic development, labour issues and international economics.

Eduardo Bianchi is a Research Leader in FLACSO and the Coordinator of Projects on Trade & Poverty in LATN (Latin American Trade Network). He has an M.A. degree and is a PhD in economics from New York University, as well as a BA in Economics from the University of Buenos Aires. He has been a WTO instructor and panelist, and held positions with large public responsibilities as head of the Director of International Trade Commission and Undersecretary for International Economic Relations in Argentina. He also teaches contingency trade measures at the Catholic University of Argentina and the University of Tres de Febrero in Buenos Aires.

Roberto Bouzas (UDESA, Argentina/Red Mercosur) is a Professor at the Universidad de San Andrés and an independent researcher at CONICET. He has an M.A. in economics from Cambridge University, England and a B.A. in economics from the University of Buenos Aires. He is also the Academic Director of the Master of International Relations and Negotiations Program run jointly by FLACSO-Universidad de San Andrés-Universidad de Barcelona, and a Professor of international economics in the Faculty of Economics at University of Buenos Aires.

Andrew Cooper is Associate Director and Distinguished Fellow at the Centre for International Governance Innovation and a Professor of political science at the University of Waterloo, where he teaches in international political economy, global governance and comparative politics. He is a member of the International Advisory Board of both the GARNET Network of Excellence and the Hague Journal of Diplomacy, and has been a member of the Warwick Commission. Dr. Cooper's most recent publications focus on emerging powers, G8 reform, small states, Latin America, global health governance and the phenomenon of celebrity diplomacy.

Jean Daudelin is an Assistant Professor in the Norman Paterson School of International Affairs (NPSIA) at Carleton University and holds a PhD from Laval University. He is a specialist on Latin America, particularly Brazil and Central America, where he has researched religious movements, indigenous politics, urban violence, economic integration, and regional politics. His current research focuses on property rights and conflict, on the development and conflict implications of government revenue composition, and on the comparative foreign policy of Canada and Brazil.

Daniel Drache is a Professor of political science at York University and Associate Director of the Robarts Centre for Canadian Studies. He has worked and published extensively on the area of globalization in its economic, social and cultural dimensions. He has worked on the WTO's Doha Round with particular focus on TRIPS and public health, food security and nutrition, and poverty eradication. His current research themes include North American integration, the role of borders in NAFTA, and the impact of new information technologies.

Alan Fairlie Reinoso is a Peruvian economist with a BA from the Pontificia Universidad Católica del Perú and a M.A. in International Trade and Development from the Instituto Torcuato Di Tella, Buenos Aires. He is a member of the LATN Steering Committee, and a Professor and Researcher at the Economics Department of the Pontificia Universidad Católica del Perú (PUCP). He has been a consultant to ECLAC and Andean Community of Nations, and is in the Advisory Committee on International Trade Negotiations at the Foreign Affairs Ministry of Peru.

Philippe Faucher is a Research Associate of Center for International Studies and Research (Centre d'Études et de Recherches Internationales – CERIU) and a member of the International Economy Network (Réseau Économie Internationale – RÉI) at the University of Montreal. He is also the former director of the Department of Political Science at the University of Montreal. His fields of specialization are Latin America, development strategies and government policies.

María Alejandra González Pérez has a PhD from the National University of Ireland, Galway, and is head of department of International Business at Universidad EAFIT in Medellín, Colombia. She is also the director of research group in International Studies there and member of the editorial board of the journal *Kanata*, Focus on Canada. Her research areas are: international migration, and corporate social responsibility. Prior to her post in Colombia, she worked as a researcher at the National University of Ireland, Galway.

María Teresa Gutiérrez Haces has a PhD in Political Science and International Relations from the University of Sorbonne-Nouvelle, studied Economic Development at the University of Lovaine, Belgium and has an MA in Economics from the University of Amberes, Belgium. She is currently a senior researcher and professor at the Institute for Economic Research at the Autonomous University of Mexico (UNAM). Her research on Canada and its relations with Mexico has received several prizes in both nations, and she is the founder and former president of the Mexican Association for Canadian Studies (AMEC).

Paul Haslam is an Assistant Professor in the Graduate School of Public and International Affairs at the University of Ottawa. Previously, he worked at the Canadian Foundation for the Americas (FOCAL), where he remains a Senior Fellow. His research on international development and international political economy focuses on corporate social responsibility, state-firm relations in Latin America (particularly Argentina and Chile), the international

regulation of foreign direct investment and the political economy of institutional reform in Latin America.

Pablo Heidrich holds an M.A. in International Political Economy from the University of Tsukuba, Japan, and a PhD (ABD) in Political Economy and Public Policy from the University of Southern California. He is a senior researcher on trade and development at the North-South Institute. His current work is on the political economy of energy, international trade negotiations, and Canada - Latin American relations. Prior to joining NSI, he worked at the Facultad Latinoamericana de Ciencias Sociales (FLACSO) in Buenos Aires on regionalism, energy infrastructure integration.

Annette Hester is an independent scholar who has worked with the Centre for International Governance Innovation in Waterloo, the Canadian International Council, and the Centre d'études interaméricaines at Université Laval. She is also a senior associate with the William E. Simon Chair in Political Economy at Centre for Strategic and International Studies in Washington, D.C. Previously, she was the founding director of the Latin American Research Centre at the University of Calgary. She has extensive experience providing consulting services in several countries of the Americas on energy policies, economic development and governance.

Andy Hira is an Associate Professor at the Department of Political Science at Simon Fraser University, where he is also cross-appointed with the Latin American Studies Program, and holds a PhD from Claremont University. His geographical focus is on the MERCOSUR countries of South America and has authored various publications on economic integration, energy regulation, participatory governance and fair trade.

Célio Hiratuka (IE/UNICAMP, Brazil / Red Mercosur) holds a PhD in economics from the Universidade Estadual de Campinas, UNICAMP and is a professor at the UNICAMP Economics Institute and researcher for the UNICAMP Industrial Economics and Technology Group (NEIT). He is the author of various publications on international commerce, foreign direct investment, and industrial economics. He is also the author of various book chapters on productive internationalization and international commerce, as well as transnational companies.

Kathryn Hochstetler is the Centre for International Governance Innovation Chair of Governance in the Americas in the Balsillie School of International Affairs and a professor of political science at the University of Waterloo. She holds a PhD in political science from the University of Minnesota and has published extensively on civil society and social movements, environmental politics and presidentialism. Her current research focuses on the role of protest and civil society organizations in current South American politics and Brazilian development choices for the 21st century.

Sonia Laszlo holds a PhD in Economics from the University of Toronto and is an Assistant Professor in the Department of Economics at McGill University. Her fields of specialization are development economics, labour economics, experimental economics and economics of education.

Andrés López (CENIT, Argentina/Red Mercosur) is the Executive Director of the Red Mercosur, he holds a Ph.D. in economics from the University of Buenos Aires and is a Director at CENIT (Centro de Investigaciones para la Transformación). He is a Professor and Chair of the Department of Economics at the Faculty of Economic of the University of Buenos Aires. His area of specialization are industrial economics, foreign investment and technological change.

Laura Macdonald is a Professor of political science at Carleton University, and co-director of the Centre on North American Politics and Society. She has published on the role of non-governmental organizations in development, global civil society, citizenship struggles in Latin America, Canadian development assistance and the political impact of the NAFTA on human rights and democracy in the three member states. Her current research projects include social citizenship in North America and the impact of NAFTA on security, immigration and border control policies.

Fernando Masi (CADEP, Paraguay/Red Mercosur) holds a master's in international politics and economics from SAIS, the Johns Hopkins University, and is a senior researcher for CADEP. He is a senior advisor to the Paraguayan Ministry on Industry and Trade, and has been a special advisor to the Department of Foreign Relations on Mercosur issues. He is the author of numerous publications on economics and international politics, as well as trade, integration and competition.

Pedro da Motta Veiga is a specialist in international trade topics, trade negotiations, industrial and trade policy. He is a member of the LATN Steering Committee and the Board of Directors of CINDES (Center of Studies on Integration and Development). He is a permanent consultant of the Brazilian National Confederation of Industries, editor of the Brazilian Journal of External Trade and visiting professor in the Institut d'Études Politiques –Paris. He has been consultant for various firms, governments and BIRD, OCDE, WTO, IADB, UNCTAD, ECLAC and LAIA.

Doris Osterlof Obregón has an M.A. in International Politics and is a specialist on international trade. She teaches Trade and International Negotiations in the University of Costa Rica and is an international consultant on trade issues. She was minister-counselor at the Embassy of Costa Rica to the European Union, Belgium and Luxembourg, in charge of political issues, cooperation and trade and executive director of the Chamber of Exporters of Costa Rica, and of the Central Export Federation (FECAEXCA).

Juliana Peixoto Batista has an M.A. in International Relations from the University of Buenos Aires and a Law degree from the Federal University of Ceará (Brazil). She is the Coordinator of the Latin American Trade Network (LATN) and a researcher at the International Economic Institutions Program (PIEI) of FLACSO Argentina on regional integration, human rights, and international trade. She is an assistant professor at the University of Buenos Aires and has worked as a legal consultant for the government of Buenos Aires City.

Ronald Rojas is Project Manager for Education and Health at the Canadian Foundation for the Americas (FOCAL). He has an MA in Economics from Carleton University and his research has focused on economic development, international trade and agricultural economics. Previously, he was the Bolivian private sector's responsible for negotiations of the Free Trade Area between the Andean Countries and the U.S. and has worked for international organizations and NGOs in La Paz, Ottawa, Montreal and Conakry, Guinea.

Arne Rückert is a Postdoctoral Fellow in the Department of Political Studies and the Centre for International Policy Studies (CIPS) at the University of Ottawa. He is the author of numerous journal articles and book chapters on the World Bank and the International Monetary Fund's development policies, which have appeared in *Studies in Political Economy*; *the Canadian Journal of Development Studies*; *Labour, Capital and Society*; and *Review of International Political Economy*, and in various edited collections.

Diana Tussie holds a PhD in American Studies from the University College of London and a PhD in International Relations and Economics from the London School of Economics. She is the current director of the Area of International Relations in FLACSO, the director of the Latin American trade Network (LATN), and an independent researcher for the National Council of Scientific and Technical Research (CONICET). Tussie was also a distinguished Fulbright Scholar in International Relations for the 50th anniversary of the Fulbright Commission in 1996, and teaches international trade at FLACSO and the National Institute of Foreign Service.

Vivianne Ventura-Dias has a PhD in Agricultural and Natural Resources Economics from the University of California, Berkeley. She was a founding member of the Latin American Trade Network (LATN) is currently an associate professor in the Institute of International Relations at Federal University of Santa Catarina. She is an international consultant on trade and trade negotiations, and has written widely on the distributive aspects of trade, trade related rules and global integration, in particular on the gender equity dimension of these areas.

Dayna Zaclicever (DECON-UDELAR, Uruguay/Red Mercosur) is an assistant professor at the Department of Economics of the Universidad de la República of Uruguay (School of Social Sciences), where she carries out research and teaching activities since 2004. Her research topics include international trade and integration, economic growth and development, industrial economics and applied microeconometrics.
